

## 2001 ENROLLMENT FACT SHEET (MAJOR CHANGES FROM 6/30/2000 – 6/30/2001)

- ALABAMA – The State Medicaid Enrollment increase was due to SOBRA kids and the 1115 family planning waiver that added women below 133% of poverty-level.
- ARIZONA – The State Medicaid Enrollment increase was due to the increase in population and changes in income determination for eligibility; (2) Ventana<sup>1</sup> Health System no longer participates in the Medicaid program.
- DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA – George Washington University Health<sup>1</sup> and American Preferred<sup>1</sup> no longer participate in the Medicaid program.
- FLORIDA – (1) The State Medicaid Enrollment increase was due to outreach and expansion of Medicaid eligibility for children and teens; (2) Charter Glade (PCCM) and MedChoice<sup>1</sup> no longer participate in the Medicaid program.
- GEORGIA – The State Medicaid Enrollment increase was due to eligibility expansion.
- ILLINOIS – Illinois Masonic Community Health Plan<sup>1</sup> and Neighborly Care Plan<sup>1</sup> no longer participate in Medicaid Program.
- INDIANA – (1) The State Medicaid Enrollment increase was due to the successful outreach for the Hoosier Healthwise managed care program; (2) Maxicare<sup>1</sup> (MaxiHealth) no longer participates in Medicaid Program.
- KENTUCKY – Kentucky Health Select and HMO program no longer participate in the Medicaid program.
- MAINE – Nylcare Health Plans of Maine, Inc.<sup>1</sup> no longer participates in Medicaid Program.
- MASSACHUSETTS – (1) The State Medicaid Enrollment increased was due to outreach efforts; (2) Behavioral Health Partnership enrollment decreased due do to enrollees receiving behavioral health services through a MCO instead of PHP.
- MARYLAND – (1) The State Medicaid and Managed Care Enrollment increase was due to SCHIP enrollment; (2) Prime Health<sup>1</sup> and Freestate Health<sup>1</sup> no longer participate in the Medicaid program.
- MICHIGAN – American Family Care<sup>1</sup>, Blue Care Network<sup>1</sup>, Good Health Plan<sup>1</sup>, Health Alliance Plan<sup>1</sup>, Oakwood St. John's Health<sup>1</sup>, Physician's Health Plan of South Michigan<sup>1</sup>,

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Pro-Care Health Plan<sup>1</sup>, Select Care MCO<sup>1</sup>, and Ultimed HMO of Michigan<sup>1</sup> no longer participate in the Medicaid program.

- MINNESOTA – Group Health, Inc.<sup>1</sup> no longer participates in the Medicaid program.
- MISSISSIPPI – (1) The State Medicaid Enrollment increase was due to efforts to re-enroll eligibles who lost eligibility for Medicaid when TANF was implemented and SCHIP enrollment.
- MISSOURI – The State Medicaid and Managed Care Enrollment increase was due to outreach conducted for MC+ For Kids
- MONTANA – Blue Cross and Blue Shield<sup>1</sup> no longer participates in the Medicaid program.
- NEVADA – The State Medicaid Enrollment increase was due to State's growing population, a downturn in the State's economy that led to increase unemployment, and the growth of TANF eligible population.
- NEW JERSEY – The State Medicaid Enrollment increase was due to the inclusion of retroactivity and increase in the enrollment of parents for SCHIP children.
- NEW YORK – Compre-Care<sup>1</sup> and HUM Healthcare Systems<sup>1</sup> no longer participate in the Medicaid program.
- NORTH CAROLINA – The State Medicaid and Managed Care Enrollment increase was due to reinstatement of individuals for at least 1-month due to Work First.
- OHIO – (1) The State Medicaid Enrollment increase was due to an overall increase in caseload and the impact of Preferred Option, which was initiated in the early spring of 2001 in four counties; (2) Emerald HMO<sup>1</sup> and Total Health Care Plan<sup>1</sup> no longer participate in the Medicaid program, (3) Dayton Area Health Plan<sup>1</sup> is now CareSource.
- OKLAHOMA – Bluelincs<sup>1</sup> no longer participates in the Medicaid program.
- OREGON – (1) The State Medicaid Enrollment increase was due to normal growth and economic circumstances; (2) Regence HMO<sup>1</sup> and Tillamook Counseling Inc.<sup>2</sup> no longer participate in the Medicaid program; (3) Multnomah CaapCare<sup>3</sup> is now Multnomah County Verity<sup>4</sup>.
- PENNSYLVANIA – The State Medicaid Managed Care Enrollment increase was due to the managed care expansion to new regions.
- PUERTO RICO – The State Medicaid Managed Care Enrollment increase was due to the expansion of service areas.
- SOUTH CAROLINA – The State Medicaid Enrollment increase was due to SCHIP population.

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- TENNESSEE – The State Medicaid Enrollment increase was due to normal growth and freeze on disenrollment process for certain waiver population groups.
- TEXAS – Magellan Behavior Health, Inc.<sup>4</sup> no longer participates in the Medicaid program. Access is now Humana.
- UTAH – Altius<sup>1</sup> no longer participates in the Medicaid program.
- WASHINGTON – (1) Kaiser<sup>1</sup> and Regence<sup>1</sup> no longer participate in the Medicaid program; (2) Clark United Providers<sup>1</sup> is now Columbia United Providers<sup>1</sup>; (3) Qual-Med<sup>1</sup> is now Molina<sup>1</sup>.
- WEST VIRGINIA – Chartered Health<sup>1</sup> is now Health Priority<sup>1</sup>.
- WISCONSIN – Physician Plus<sup>1</sup> no longer participates in the Medicaid program.
