ELIGIBILITY UNDER SECTION 1931 OF THE ACT

The State covers low-income families and children under section 1931 of the Act.

The following groups were included in the AFDC State plan effective July 16, 1996:

Pregnant women with no other eligible children

AFDC children age 18 who are full-time students in a secondary school or in the equivalent level of vocational or technical training.

In determining eligibility for Medicaid, the agency uses the AFDC standards and methodologies in effect as of July 16, 1996 without modification.

In determining eligibility for Medicaid, the agency uses the AFDC standards and methodologies in effect as of July 16, 1996 with the following modifications.

The agency applies lower income standards which are no lower than the AFDC standards in effect on May 1, 1988, as follows:

The agency applies higher income standards than those in effect as of July 16, 1996, increased by no more than the percentage increases in the CPI-U since July 1, 1996, as follows:

The agency applies higher resource standards than those in effect as of July 16, 1996, increased by no more than the percentage increases in the CPI-U since July 16, 1996, as follows:

X The agency uses less restrictive income and/or resource methodologies than those in effect as of July 16, 1996, as follows:

1. The total value of all resources are disregarded.
2. Disregard \$250 and 1/2 of the remainder of earned income for each employed member. Or
3. If families are not financially eligible using the disregard as described above in item 2: disregard the difference in combined gross nonexempt earned and unearned income between 100% FPL and the January payment standard as reflected below for the appropriate household size for a period of 24 months.
4. Disregard any amount equal to ^{the difference between} the July 1996 AFDC payment standard and the January 1, 2000 payment standard for the appropriate household size. The payment standards are as follows:

The income and/or resource methodologies that the less restrictive methodologies replace are as follows:

1. There was a \$1,000 resource limit.
2. The earned income disregard was \$90 and \$30 and 1/3 of the remainder.
3. There was no such disregard.
4. There was no such disregard.

X The agency terminates medical assistance (except for certain pregnant women and children) for individuals who fail to meet TANF work requirements.

Only medical assistance is terminated for the adult member of the household fails to meet TANF work requirements. The termination ends when the individuals cooperates in meeting the work requirements.

 The agency continues to apply the following waivers of provisions of Part A of the title IV in effect as of July 16, 1996, or submitted prior to August 22, 1996 and approved by the Secretary on or before July 1, 1997.

Waiver of section 402(a)(41) and 407 of the Act, 45 CFR 233.100 (a)(1) and (c)(1)(iii). A child will be considered deprived if family income is below the applicable income standard, regardless of the Number of hours that the principal wage earner is employed.
