

## Information and Assistance Resources for Medicare Beneficiaries

There are several options available to provide prescription drug cost assistance to Medicare beneficiaries, including Medicare-approved drug discount cards, state pharmacy assistance programs, and manufacturers' discount programs. Medicare recognizes that pharmacists and other pharmacy professionals have limited time to counsel customers. The following resources offer information and assistance to Medicare beneficiaries in finding the greatest savings on their prescription drugs.

### The 1-800-MEDICARE (1-800-633-4227) Toll-Free Call Center

This Call Center is available 24 hours per day and 7 days per week. It connects beneficiaries with customer service representatives who can answer questions and perform price comparisons for drug discount cards and other assistance programs. Beneficiaries should prepare a list of current prescription drugs and dosages prior to contacting the Call Center. Beneficiaries may request a copy of their individualized price comparison results. TTY users should call 1-877-486-2048.



# The Medicare-Approved Drug Discount Cards and Transitional Assistance Program

## Overview

Your relationship with Medicare beneficiaries means that you may be asked questions about Medicare-Approved Drug Discount Cards and Transitional Assistance Program. This brochure is designed to help you assist Medicare customers in finding the information they need, and also give you an overview of the new Medicare-Approved Drug Discount Cards and Transitional Assistance Program.

Drug discount cards leverage the ability of large groups to receive discounts from drug manufacturers. Private companies will design discount card programs with the Medicare-approved seal. The drug discount card programs may have drug discount lists (formularies) that provide savings on brand name and generic prescription drugs to qualified beneficiaries. The discount drug lists may be different for each card, and may be subject to change. Therefore, it is important that beneficiaries consider their choices carefully.

## New Medicare Programs

The Medicare Modernization Act of 2003 (MMA) introduces changes that are designed to strengthen the current Medicare Program. Over the next three years, there will be major landmarks in Medicare coverage:

- In 2004, temporary Medicare-approved drug discount cards are available for qualifying beneficiaries. Also, under the Transitional Assistance Program, certain low-income beneficiaries qualify for a \$600 credit to help pay for prescription drugs;
- In 2005, new preventive benefits will be covered, including a one-time Welcome-to-Medicare wellness physical exam and screening tests for the early detection of diabetes and cardiovascular diseases; and
- In 2006, prescription drug benefit plans will be available to all Medicare beneficiaries.

## Highlights of the Drug Discount Cards

- A temporary program until the new Medicare prescription drug coverage starts in 2006;
- Enrollment started in May 2004;
- Available to qualified beneficiaries regardless of income;

- May charge an annual enrollment fee of no more than \$30, which may be paid by Medicare for some low-income beneficiaries;
- Require private companies to provide beneficiaries the ability to use their discount cards in pharmacies near their homes; and
- Beneficiaries are **not** required to purchase prescription drugs through mail-order pharmacies.

## Eligibility for the Drug Discount Cards

Beneficiaries qualify for a drug discount card regardless of income, if:

- They are entitled to Medicare Part A (inpatient hospital coverage) and/or enrolled in Medicare Part B (outpatient health care and doctor fee coverage); and
- They are not receiving outpatient prescription drug benefits through State Medicaid programs.

## Transitional Assistance Program

Beneficiaries with the greatest need will have the greatest help available to them. A \$600 credit is available for each calendar year (2004 and 2005) to help Medicare beneficiaries pay for prescription drugs.

## Eligibility for the Transitional Assistance Program

- Individuals with an annual income in 2004 of no more than \$12,569 if single or \$16,862 if married, and individuals receiving help from their state in paying their Medicare premiums or cost sharing, may qualify for a \$600 credit on their discount card to help pay for prescription drugs. These income limits change every year.
- Residents of Puerto Rico or a U.S. territory are not eligible for the \$600 credit from Medicare. However, they may be eligible for similar assistance provided by the territory in which they reside.
- Beneficiaries cannot qualify for the \$600 credit if they already have outpatient prescription drug coverage from certain other sources.

## Medicare-Approved Drug Discount Cards

Beneficiaries will bring their discount cards to the pharmacy with their prescription(s). The discount cards will carry the Medicare-approved seal, which will look like this:



Medicare beneficiaries will receive their prescription drugs at a discounted price, depending on the prescription drug and the card's discount drug list. Since each discount card will offer different discounts on prescription drugs, Medicare beneficiaries should review their current list of prescription drugs and select a card that offers the best savings for them.

## Special Concerns of Pharmacists and Pharmacy Professionals About the Drug Discount Cards

Some pharmacy associations have expressed concerns about how the Medicare-approved drug discount cards will impact the role of pharmacists and other pharmacy professionals in patient interaction. Because Medicare beneficiaries are more apt to seek out their local pharmacists or pharmacy professionals for advice, Medicare believes that the discount cards may allow further development of relationships with Medicare beneficiaries. In fact, our materials will remind beneficiaries to consider the importance of the relationship with their pharmacist or pharmacy professional when selecting a discount card.

For discount cards to be Medicare-approved, private companies must guarantee that consumers in urban, suburban, and rural areas are able to use their discount cards in pharmacies near their homes:

- Rural Areas - Where 70% of customers are within 15 miles of their homes.
- Suburban Areas - Where 90% of customers are within 5 miles of their homes.
- Urban Areas - Where 90% of customers are within 2 miles of their homes.
