### **Background**

- On October 22, 1998, the State of Hawaii submitted a state plan to implement a Medicaid expansion for uninsured children ages 1 to 6 in families with income between 133 and 185 percent of the Federal Poverty level (FPL).

### **Amendments**

- On January 11, 2000, Hawaii submitted a state plan amendment to cover all uninsured children up to age 19 in families with income up to 200 percent of FPL, under a Medicaid expansion.
- On August 22, 2002, Hawaii submitted a state plan amendment to update, in part, its SCHIP state plan to indicate compliance with the requirements of the final SCHIP regulations. The State expects to submit a complete, consolidated SCHIP state plan, demonstrating compliance with all requirements of the final SCHIP regulations, by the end of 2002.

### **Children Covered Under Program**

- The State reported that 7,137 children were ever enrolled in its program during Federal fiscal year 2001.

### **Administration**

- The program is administered by the Med-QUEST Division within the Department of Human Services.

## **Health Care Delivery System**

- Non-disabled children are served through the managed care system in operation for QUEST, the State's Section 1115 health reform demonstration program. Children with disabilities are served through the State's fee-for-service system.

## **Benefit Package**

- SCHIP enrollees have the standard Medicaid benefit package.

## **Cost Sharing**

- No cost sharing is imposed.

## **Outreach Activities**

- The State is coordinating with groups providing services to low-income children ages 1-6, including the Hawaii Association for the Education of Young Children; Alu Like, a private, non-profit organization providing services to Hawaiian/Part Hawaiian families; the Kamehameha School Bishop Estate, which operates over 30 preschools; the Good Beginnings Alliance, a private, non-profit agency playing a multifaceted role as an umbrella network; and State agencies such as the Department of Human Services, Department of Education, and Department of Health.
- The State is collaborating with schools to provide Medicaid and SCHIP information and to follow-up with children who participate in the National School Lunch Program and children whose emergency contact cards indicate that they have no or limited health insurance.
- The State is distributing Medicaid and SCHIP information through health care providers, the unemployment office, the Office of Youth Services, places of worship, and activity-based organizations such as sports, scouts, and schools of Hula.
- The State established a toll-free information line and a web site, and is conducting a media campaign on the SCHIP program.
