### **Section 2.1 - Demographic Information**


The State of Idaho is distinguished by its frontier counties--defined in Idaho as a county with fewer than six people per square mile--and the challenges **this** poses for designing and administering human services programs. Although racially homogenous for the most part, there are concentrations of culturally diverse populations in several counties.

Demographic information for children in Idaho is difficult to summarize due to the variability of data collection and reporting methods. There are several sources of information that report similar, yet different data. Data are collected for varying age ranges, poverty levels, and reporting periods. **This** section will provide data from several sources concerning age breakouts, income brackets, definitions of insurability, and geographic location as well as age and ethnicity to provide an overall picture of the special demographic characteristics of Idaho.


#### **Health Insurance**

The data related to health insurance comes from varying sources that span differing time periods and utilize dissimilar age brackets. In order to facilitate the presentation of the data, population estimates have been brought forward to the Idaho Department of Welfare's current 1997 estimates, and all age bracketing **has** been adjusted to incorporate the 0 to 18 age range. Presentation of the unadjusted data can be found in Appendix C.

For 1997, there are approximately 418,000 children under the age of 19 living in Idaho. Of those, approximately 202,500 reside in households earning incomes at or below 200 percent of the federally designated poverty level, or \$31,200 according to the U. S. Department of Health and Human Services Poverty Guidelines which set the 1996 Federal poverty limit at \$15,600 for a family of four. Most of those children are covered by some form of health insurance; however, approximately 36,297, or 17.9 percent, of the 202,500 children living **in** families with incomes at 200 percent of the poverty level or less do not have health insurance. For all income levels, there are **an** estimated 53,378 children in Idaho who do not have health insurance.




Of the children in Idaho who had health insurance during some part of **1996** regardless of family income, **70.5** percent were privately insured, **19.8** percent were enrolled in Medicaid, **0.5** percent were enrolled in Medicare, and **3.2** were covered by military health care programs. Children who did not have health insurance at any point in the year represented **13.2** percent of the total number of children for **1996**. The estimate of children who will have had no insurance for **1997** is **12.8** percent. (These percentages do not add to **100** because some children may have had more than one insurer in a 12-month period.)



***Children in Families at the Poverty Level***

The number of children under the age of **19** who live in families earning up to 200 percent of the poverty level without health insurance can be broken out into several income brackets. **This** was accomplished by applying family income poverty level percentages to the projected number of uninsured children. Using statistics developed for The Casey Foundation by the University of Louisville, it can be estimated that, of the **53,378** uninsured children in Idaho, **19,752** fall within the range of **100** to **200** percent of the poverty limit, making them potentially eligible for Title XXI coverage. The calculations show that there are **5,029** children Without health insurance

between 101 and 120 percent of the poverty level, 4,494 between 121 and 140 percent of the poverty level, 3,952 between 141 and 160 percent of the poverty level, 3,410 between 161 and 180 percent of the poverty level, and 2,868 between 181 and 200 percent of the poverty level.



The percentages were **also** used to determine the number of children who would be eligible to receive expanded Medicaid services under Title XXI based on the financial impact of providing benefits. The number of children was calculated by **taking** the number of uninsured children between 100 and 200 percent of the poverty level and subtracting the number of children who are currently receiving services through **an** earlier Medicaid expansion program **known as** Pregnant Women and Children, or PWC. **This** program provides enhanced Medicaid services to pregnant women and children who are residing in homes earning up to 133 percent of the poverty level. There are approximately 5,937 children eligible for the PWC program who will continue to be eligible for PWC and will not be considered newly eligible for the child health insurance program.

The State of Idaho estimates that 7,538 children will be eligible for the Title XXI Medicaid expansion, with Medicaid eligibility increased to 160 percent of the poverty level.

**As** a comparison to the nation **as** a whole, median incomes in Idaho are not far from the national average. Using Census Bureau data from 1993, the latest year in which **data** are available, the median household income in Idaho was \$28,989 while the comparable **figure** for the United States was \$31,241.

The number of children living in poverty (less than 100 percent of the poverty level) varies greatly by county. Although the statewide average is 16.2 percent, the percentage by county ranges **from** 6.8 in Caribou County to 34.5 in Owyhee County. Table 2.1 illustrates the differences in poverty rates across all Idaho counties. Table 2.2 presents the number of children living in poverty, by county.

**Race, Sex, and Ethnicity by Age Statewide**

Idaho is a racially homogenous state, with 96.72 percent of people classifying themselves as “White.” Table 2.3 depicts statewide data on race, sex, and ethnicity by age for children in Idaho. The final column shows the percentage of the total population up to 19 years of age that each category represents.

## **Race, Sex, and Ethnicity by Age, by County**

Detailed data on children living in the 44 counties in Idaho shows much of the same homogeneity as the State. A few counties stand out as having a different racial makeup than the State as a whole. Eleven counties clustered in the southern half of the State contain populations of Hispanic children that exceed 10 percent of the total for the county. Lewis and Nez Perce counties in the northern third of the State contain the largest population of American Indian, Eskimo, and Aleut children. Appendix B contains demographic tables for each county.

### **22 Describe the current state efforts to provide or obtain creditable health coverage for uncovered children by addressing: (Section 2102)(a)(2)**

#### **2.2.1. The steps the state is currently taking to identify and enroll all uncovered children who are eligible to participate in public health insurance programs (i.e. Medicaid and state-only child health insurance):**

The Idaho Department of Health and Welfare has outreach to families built into the nature of its structure. As an umbrella human services organization, the Department has direct responsibility for child protection, child abuse prevention, family cash and other subsidy income supports, developmental services, and mental health and substance abuse services. The Department staff include line personnel in each of these areas who have daily contact with children and families as well as regular contact with community leaders. These contacts provide a level of knowledge of available services, not the least of which is Medicaid and the recent expansion of the poverty upper limit for children. Given that knowledge, Department line staff frequently have the opportunity to advise many lower-income families of the range of services offered by the Department. The staff also have the opportunity to explain the programs of the Department to the communities in which they operate.

For example, the single mother who needs assistance through a child care subsidy will find information about the Medicaid program readily present when she comes to the DHW offices to apply. Should she mention to the Department self-reliance staff person assisting with the child care subsidy application that she has no health coverage for her family, that staff person can be of assistance. The staff person is knowledgeable about Medicaid eligibility and can work with the applicant to determine whether Medicaid is a needed support for the applicant and, if so, the Medicaid coverage that is applicable for the applicant based on household income level and other factors.

Another example is a Department-administered child abuse prevention program that is a joint process with elementary schools and preschools. This program is soon to be statewide; three years of formal research have demonstrated its efficacy in two large school districts in the State. Additional resources were allocated to

the program in October 1997 to transition to a statewide program. In **this** Communities Resources for Families program, Department social workers make contact with families referred by the teachers due to an identified school issue for a child (e.g., decreased academic performance, health matter, apparent stress, and other indicators). The program is voluntary for families **that** are referred; most elect to use the program and find it beneficial. Because the social worker is engaged with the family for up to 90 days, the various supports that may assist in stabilizing the family issues are thoroughly explored. Such supports include health care coverage, housing, family relationships, and other basic needs. While not “doing for” the families, the social workers do assist in facilitating applications and clarification of processes that may be difficult for families to manage in order to access a service such **as** Medicaid. A further integration of services is the use of a joint application form for social services that is employed by both DHW and county workers to collect information on a family.

Yet another example is the immediate contact that is made with families that have a child born with disabilities or that are identified **as** being at high risk for developmental disabilities. The Department and community professionals who make **this** contact understand the basic Medicaid coverage elements and are able to describe and refer people to the program for eligibility determination. Similar approaches **are** used for outreach in the areas of mental health, substance abuse, and other health needs.

Regional DHW offices distribute posters and brochures to local health services provider sites and conduct informational meetings for the Medicaid-eligible population. The State administers a Child Special Health Program and a Healthy Connections managed care program. The Child Special Health Program identifies eligible participants through hospital and clinic referrals. Healthy Connections is a managed care waiver program administered by the State of Idaho for Medicaid clients. The program assigns a primary care physician to each enrollee and is operated under a Section 1915(b) Federal waiver. The objective of the program is to reduce program costs, reduce inappropriate use of medical services, and ensure access to quality care for Idaho Medicaid clients. In addition, regional DHW offices make referrals to the Blue Cross Caring for Kids program.

The existing outreach is not the full extent of the planned effort to ensure that parents know of the health insurance possibilities through the new Federal/State Title XXI partnership. The Department Director has an emphasis on other child-related initiatives that includes outreach in the areas of child care and early development. The outreach for Title XXI is included in that effort which was begun in November 1997 out of her office. She has assigned a Department Deputy Director to the task of developing **an** outreach plan that is consistent with the objectives of **Idaho's** policy leaders, the needs of Idaho's communities, and that builds on existing health care delivery programs.

Efforts to identify uncovered children for public-private programs are conducted primarily by advocacy groups and are not a formal part of the State's eligibility determination process.

Enrollment for the Title XXI expanded Medicaid program will be closely coordinated with enrollment for Medicaid by integrating outreach for expanded enrollment with current Medicaid enrollment efforts. Enhancements to current efforts will also include outreach to children eligible for Medicaid, under Title XIX, but not currently enrolled.

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## **Section 5. Outreach and Coordination (Section 2102(c))**

### **Introduction**

The State of Idaho recognizes that outreach to children who are newly eligible for Medicaid under Title XXI legislation will contribute to the overall success in implementing the Medicaid child health expansion. In addition, Idaho anticipates that outreach efforts undertaken as part of this new program will uncover a number of children who are eligible for Medicaid but not currently enrolled under the previous eligibility rules. It is estimated that only about 45 percent of persons eligible for Medicaid in Idaho are actually enrolled in the program.

The outreach effort will be a partnership between the State and public and private child service providers using channels which are already in place. The State will make resources available, through public information materials and additional resources, to public and private organizations to continue to provide enhanced outreach services to inform families and assist them in enrolling their children into the Medicaid program. The task is to develop an outreach plan that is consistent with the objectives of Idaho's policy leaders and the needs of Idaho's communities and that integrates with existing health, social services, and education programs

### **Describe the procedures used by the state to accomplish:**

### **Section 5.1 - Targeted Outreach Program**

The targeted outreach program is designed to use State and other public and private resources to perform outreach, education, and enrollment for children in the target population. This partnership will allow outreach and education efforts to continue and expand in an environment where the target population is accustomed to receiving services. It will also put the responsibility for identifying children who may be eligible in the hands of those who have the greatest contact with the children and their families.

The target population consists of 7,538 children residing in households with incomes between 100 and 160 percent of the Federal poverty level. Children residing in households with incomes below 100 percent of the Federal poverty level are eligible for the Medicaid program under previous eligibility criteria. These estimates were derived by applying percentages from Idaho Kidscount applied to numbers from the DPW 1997 population estimate and subtracting the number of children eligible for the PWC program. Table 5.1 illustrates the distribution of uninsured children in Idaho.

### **Public and Private Efforts**

There are many public and private organizations that are currently providing services to, or are in contact with, the target population. The following discussion identifies several organizations that are representative of a portion of the child services network. Public programs such as the Women, Infants and Children (WIC) nutrition program and Head Start regularly come into contact with children who meet the eligibility guidelines of the expanded Medicaid child health program. The district health departments are in contact with the target population through efforts such as administration of immunization clinics, the Child Find program, and the Children's Special Health Program. The Child Find program identifies, through the help of physicians, speech therapists, early intervention specialists, and physical therapists, children who have developmental disabilities or are at risk of developmental disabilities. The program uses a family-centered approach by working with the family and providers to seek normalization for the child. The program treats children 0-3 years of age. When the child is 2-1/2 years old, the staff work with the schools to enroll the child at age 3 in a preschool program. The Children's Special Health Program, a program of the Division of Health, provides health care for children with significant health problems or chronic illnesses/conditions requiring long-term medical treatment and rehabilitative measures. It is a medical model program with a family-centered care approach. The program treats children 0-18 years of age.

Private programs, such as the Blue Cross Caring Program for Kids, offer private insurance at subsidized rates and reach children in the target population through advertisements and referrals to their program. The scope of coverage for this program includes primary care and emergency care services. There is a 30 percent copay for the client but no premium costs.

### **State Resources to Enhance Public and Private Efforts**

Building on existing capabilities will provide the most efficient outreach and education services. Funding from the Administration portion of Title XXI funds will be used to develop and implement a promotional campaign that will enhance public and private organizations' efforts to provide outreach and education services to the target population. The campaign will be coordinated by the DHW Office of Public Participation (OPP).

The outreach campaign will proceed in four phases. The first phase will focus on developing a theme and logo for the new Child Health Insurance Program. It is important that the design of all promotional materials be coordinated around a central message and that it be clear and easily understood by the target population. In addition, the materials will be created to be culturally sensitive and appropriate for the target population. **This** phase will also include the production of promotional materials which will consist of news releases, brochures, and posters.

The second phase will consist of distributing the materials. Primary distribution points will include **known** organizations that are currently coming into regular contact with the target population, such as those noted above, pediatricians' offices, and major employers. Emphasis will be placed on **identifying** where the most eligible children are located and targeting those areas. Special efforts will be made to employ innovative methods of identifying children in the target population who are traditionally difficult to reach. Self-Reliance Specialists (eligibility workers) at DHW regional offices will use "feedback forms" to survey Medicaid enrollees as to the method of outreach that resulted in their enrollment. Completed forms will be returned to OPP for evaluation and tracking.

In the third phase, OPP will analyze the demographic characteristics of the newly enrolled population and evaluate the "feedback forms" to determine which population of children the promotional efforts reached and which groups of children **remain** to be contacted. The analysis will reveal the specific areas where the promotional campaign needs to be expanded to reach the target population. Several factors will be addressed in the analysis including age, race, poverty level, and geographic location.

The fourth and final phase will focus on revising and tailoring the promotional campaign, based on the results of Phase 3, to reach families of children in the target population that did not respond to the initial outreach efforts. Changes to the campaign may entail new types of materials, different and expanded distribution efforts, or changes in the design and information contained in the packets to appeal to a specific population. **This** will ensure that the outreach efforts are completely responsive to families and children in the target population that may have different communication needs. The revised campaign will be implemented as soon as possible to support the continued enrollment of children eligible for the new Child Health Insurance Program.

The Division of Medicaid and Division of Welfare will review and approve all materials used in the outreach and education efforts.

### ***Enrollment Efforts***

The enrollment process will be facilitated by the existing Self-Reliance Specialists who are located statewide at sites where the targeted population receives health and welfare enrollment assistance. Children and their families will receive education about the availability of Medicaid for an expanded population and will be assisted in enrolling in the programs for which they are eligible. Where practical, Self-Reliance Specialists will be available to spend a predetermined

amount of time at selected sites for **an** “enrollment fair” or a regularly scheduled time period **to** provide assistance **to** families completing the Medicaid application form. In addition, they will be available to review applications taken for other programs **to** determine whether families meet the Medicaid eligibility guidelines, to follow up with families for additional information, or to inform the family that their children can be enrolled in Medicaid on the basis of information already given.

**5.2. Coordination of the administration of this program with other public and private health insurance programs: (Section 2102(c)(2))**

**Section 5.2 - Referral of Eligible Children to Medicaid or State-Only Program**

Because the State of Idaho is opting at **this** point to expand its Medicaid program under the provisions of the State Child Health Insurance Program, all children found eligible for Medicaid will be enrolled in Medicaid. Enrollment will occur regardless of whether the children were eligible under the previous income level or the new expanded income level.

**A** significant vehicle for informing eligible families of available Medicaid services occurs through the dissemination of educational material for Healthy Connections, a managed care 1915(b) waiver program for Medicaid clients. Information is currently included in all outreach and education activities at the regional offices. In addition, individual Healthy Connections representatives are located in each DHW regional office to conduct counseling and education for recipients who choose to participate in Healthy Connections. These representatives will continue to provide counseling and education services to the expanded population of children who choose to participate in Healthy Connections under the Medicaid expansion for Title XXI.

The State of Idaho's current efforts to provide outstationed eligibility services at Federally Qualified Health Centers (FQHCs) and disproportionate share hospitals (DSH) consist of enabling staff at these facilities to complete Medicaid application forms for patients who may qualify for Medicaid benefits. The completed application forms are submitted to the DHW local office for validation and eligibility processing. **This** practice will continue under the Medicaid expansion for Title XXI.

Finally, child support services in the Division of Welfare currently seek Medicaid coverage for children receiving child support services who reside in a home where one or both parents *are* absent. The Medicaid expansion for Title XXI will be coordinated with child support services to be sure that the additionally eligible children are identified through child support activities.

## **Section 9. Strategic Objectives and Performance Goals for the Plan Administration (Section 2107)**

### **Introduction**

The State of Idaho **has** developed a set of strategic objectives, performance goals, and performance measures to assess the success of implementing its Medicaid child health program. The objectives, goals, and measures focus on standard indicators of success in health benefits programs. The measures were developed to reflect the **data** that Idaho currently **has** available and include some HEDIS 3.0 measures. **As** the State moves toward full implementation of **HEDIS 3.0**, the measures will be revised to reflect more of those indicators.

**Through** separate studies of enrollment, access, comprehensiveness, and quality of care, the State will measure the program's performance against predetermined standards. All performance measures will represent a direct link to the performance standards and to the strategic objectives of the program. Emphasis in enrollment and access studies will be placed on assessing activities that facilitate the identification and enrollment of potential beneficiaries. To assess access to care, studies will focus on geographic analysis of provider locations compared to beneficiary locations. Well-baby care, well-child care, and immunizations will be the primary focus to assess comprehensiveness of services. Various surveys and comparison studies will be used to assess the quality of health care services provided by the program. Studies may be carried out by a subcontractor.

**9.9. Describe the process used by the state to accomplish involvement of the public in the design and implementation of the plan and the method for insuring ongoing public involvement. (Section 2107(c))**

Development of this plan will include the input of select public and private organizations that operate in the child services community.

To further facilitate the development of an effective program, the State will convene a **task** force that will be charged with determining the feasibility of developing a new Title XXI Child Health Insurance Program which may be independent of Medicaid or structured **as** a joint program. Once the **task** force is established, it will be operated under guidance from the State.

The **task** force members will be appointed by the Director of Medicaid and will consist of citizens **from** the State, including, for example, representatives of community groups, consumer and advocacy groups, State legislators, community-based providers, and other lay leaders.

The **task** force will provide direction during all phases of the program. Within the legal limits of this program, the **task** force will make recommendations to the Director on program design and implementation activities. Annually, the **task** force will review evaluation reports and records for population trends in the State. Based on this information, the **task** force can make decisions for periodic adjustments in program implementation activities.

**9.10. Provide a budget for this program. Include details on the planned use of funds and sources of the non-Federal share of plan expenditures. (Section 2107(d))**

A budget **has** been prepared to project revenue and expenses for October 1, 1997 through September 30, 1998, or the first year of operations. Revenue for the non-Federal share of funds may be obtained from the Idaho State Legislature General Fund through a legislative appropriation. The amount requested for the non-Federal share will be \$4,295,582, based on \$20,179,372 total revenue available for the State Child Health Insurance Program.

Budgeted expenses for the program are divided into two categories: administrative expenses and service expenses. The administrative expenses are estimated to be \$2,017,937, or 10 percent of the total budget. The remaining \$18,161,435 will be

available for services. The percentage allocation of funds among service categories was derived from distributive relationships on the Federal fiscal year 1996 HCFA-2082 report submitted by Idaho. Row numbers A05-2D Categorically Needy Receiving Maintenance, Children and Families with Dependent Children, A05-3D Categorically Needy Not Receiving Maintenance Assistance, Children and Families with Dependent Children, and A05-6D Coverage Groups Created by the MCCA of 1988, Children, for children's services were separated from the report and summed. The total amount for children's services, and amounts for individual service categories as appropriate, were used to calculate a percentage of funds for each service category. These percentages were applied to Title XXI funds to determine the budget for services under Title XXI.

Table 9.2 illustrates the Federal fiscal year 1998 budget.
